It would keep this name until the April 1999 issue when it was renamed and became what we have today, *Township Perspective*.

From its humble beginnings in 1941, a year that would end with the tragic Pearl Harbor bombing that would set off World War II, the magazine has evolved tremendously throughout the last 75 years. *Township Perspective*, very simply, is an information source. Over the years, the magazine has provided more and more useful content, while its actual appearance has changed as well.

It has been quite fun digging into the magazine archives and researching the history of the magazine. Muzette Allison. TOI became the actual "owner" of the magazine in 1971 when it was purchased for \$6,000. Sue, who is still very active, joins us for lunch from time

to time and shares what she remembers from the "old days" in the magazine office. It certainly was a different era then.

In my capacity as Executive Director of the Township Officials of Illinois, I also assume the duties and responsibilities of editor of the association's magazine. I have to say that this has always been and continues to be one of my favorite parts of my job. With a lot of assistance from our very talented associate editor, Amy Rourke,

and everyone else in the office who writes articles, updates mailing lists and addresses, sells advertising and the talented folks at Stevens Publishing Company, we put together the magazine 11 times a year. It is definitely a group effort.
